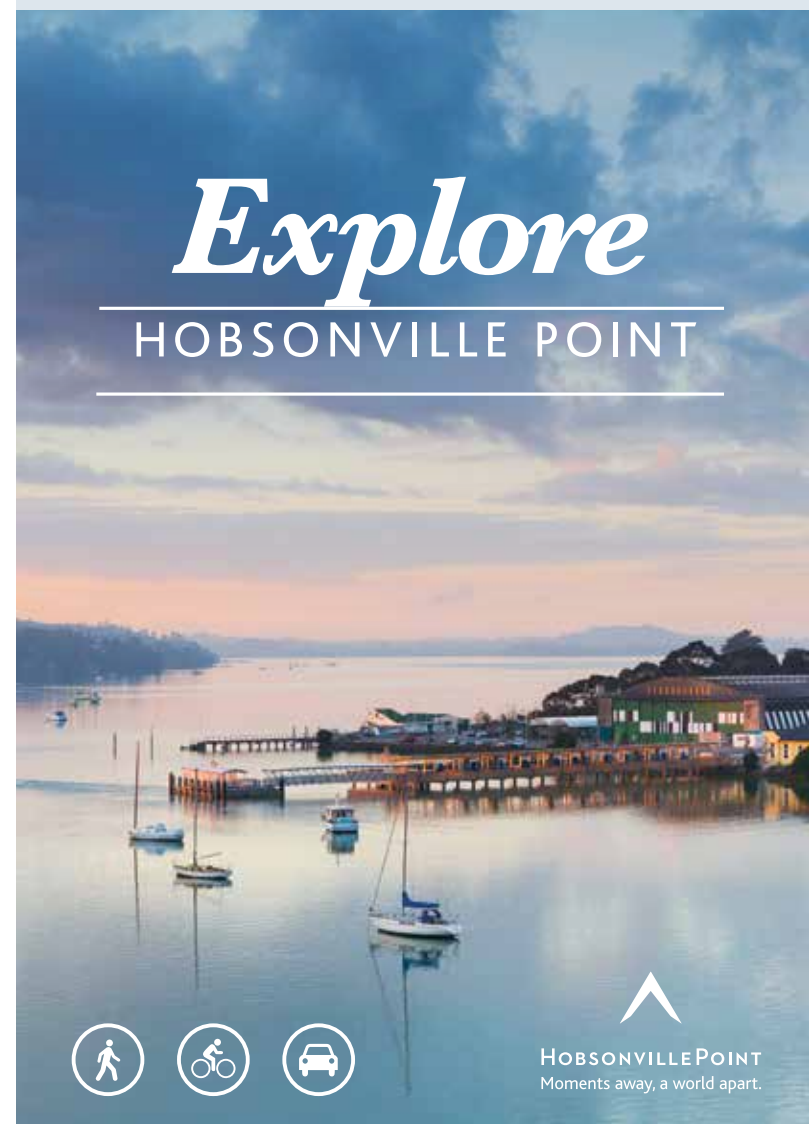

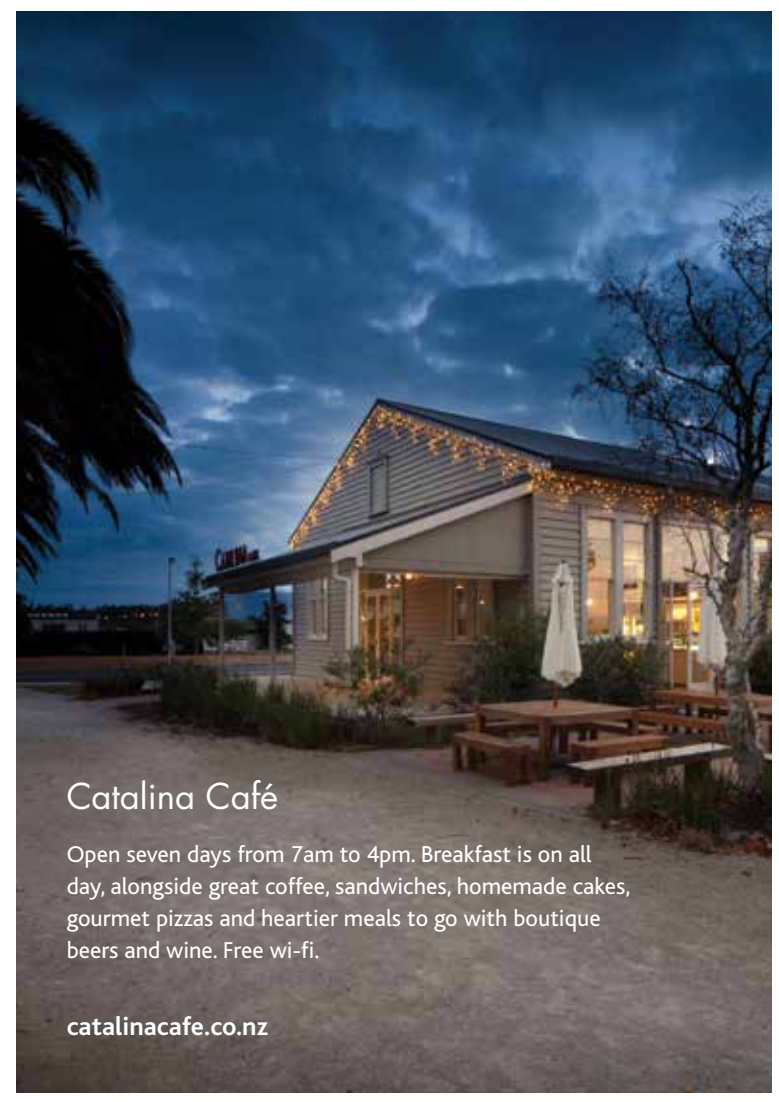

PUBLIC ART

OVAL

This heritage oval was used as a parade ground. It will be kept as a reserve for the community. Our award-winning playground is a sculptural work of art, a tribute to the beauty and resilience of our native flora, and a whole lot of fun for kids. These waterfront homes will be sold in the future.

MILL HOUSE

Mill House was built in 1929 by aviation industry pioneers, Doug and Audrey Mill, as their family home. Mill House has new owners and will serve as a childcare centre from early 2018.

HQ BUILDING

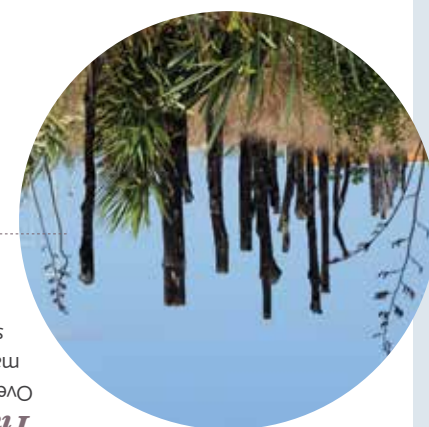
The repurposed defence force headquarters will soon be available for use by the community through Defence Memorial Auckland Council. A memorial to the men and women who lived and served at the base.

SUNDERLAND LOUNGE

This former Air force cinema and hall is available for hire as a community hall through Auckland Council.

BOMB POINT

CATALINA BAY

This is where the seaplanes used to be launched from. It will become a waterfront hub for the community with shops, cafes, apartments and offices.

Remnants of Flight

HARRIER POINT PARK



Besides stunning views this park will feature a large lawn area, barbecue, public exercise equipment, flying fox and a bucket swing.

The Memory Windmills



Remember those colourful windmills on a stick you could buy from fairs when you were a child? This sculpture recalls the simple joy the artist felt running home with his windmill held up to the breeze. (The windmills have been temporarily removed for maintenance.)

Hinaki

Hinaki, conceived as both a symbolic eel trap and a guardian, stands watch at the end of the wharf welcoming commuters home.
